Restoration of the Bohm Theatre

Earlier in the year (June meeting), the board of the AHS voted to donate to the "Lights, Camera, Action: Name a Seat Campaign". With a donation of \$500, the society sponsored one seat. Each seat sponsored through this campaign will have a personalization plaque in the arm rest. Our seat will say "Albion Historical Society".

The board felt it important to help support the preservation and restoration of our 85 year old theater. It is one place in Albion that has helped people make memories for generations.

This is one of many fundraising campaigns the Friends of the Bohm Theatre, a non-profit group, has run. The group, in partnership with Albion Community Foundation, has almost completed the multi-million dollar restoration. They have returned

the silver screen to Albion! New custom seats and carpeting compliment the decorative paint that has been done. A historic paint analysis was performed that composed the pallet for the theater and the placement of the original stenciling. Maybe you have noticed the upper portion of the marquee has been restored. The lower portion is set to be done within the next few weeks.

The theatre is now open for movies. The space lends itself beautifully to other events, such as lectures and concerts. It is also available to rent for private screenings, parties, meetings, group training, the opportunities are endless. Watch for a gala celebration to come in December when the Friends of the Bohm Theatre will celebrate the 85th anniversary of the opening on Christmas Day 1929.

Donating Records

Community History Meeting

Interested in uncovering Albion's history? We are seeking collaborators for a local history project in partnership with the State of Michigan. Join representatives from the Albion District Library, Marshall District Library, Marshall D.A.R., and the Michigan Historical Center as we explore ways to use local resources to uncover the unique story of 19th-century Black communities in Calhoun County.

The next meeting is tentatively scheduled for Thursday, January 15th, from 5:30 - 8:30 pm in the Albion District Library's Elsie Munro Room. All are welcome, new faces included.

The Community History branch meeting next month is part of a 3-year, W. K. Kellogg Foundation grant-funded project to implement change, build capacity, and reshape the Michigan Historical Museum's second floor exhibit galleries to better reflect the diversity of Michigan's stories.

Community Historian for the State Michelle S. Johnson, PhD says, "... the project will be significantly shaped by our talented and passionate collaborators as we learn the needs and

resources of people interested in documenting and highlighting this often untold part of our history.”

Gathering organizers are hoping to meet others attracted to collaborating toward the identification, introduction, or connection of resources and people. Partners like Patty Parker, with Marshall’s Governor’s Mansion Museum, hope to begin locating historical knowledge and/or resources such as stories, documents, artifacts, recordings, photographs, and/or videotapes. “Pulling together these different resources to gather data is exciting,” states Parker, “but the picture this information can paint of our community is priceless and a compelling way to teach history.

New Board Members & Albion’s Music for the Ages

Once the business of voting in new board directors was accomplished on October 11th, toes began tapping at the celebration of Albion’s musical history when the Albion Historical Society presented “Albion’s Music for the Ages” at the Caring Community Wesleyan Church on Irwin Ave.



The first performance of the evening was a musical tribute to the first inhabitants of our area, the Potawatomi. The Welcome drum song was performed by Arthur Zapata and his wife, Mon-ee Zapata, Cultural

Associate in the Cultural & Historic Preservation Office of the Nottawaseppi Huron Band of the Potawatomi.

Arranger and Narrator for the program Barb McAuliffe said she read the quote, “Music is what feelings sound like” and immediately noted, “I read the above quote and knew how our program could pull together the people of Albion through music.”

A variety of musical styles and performers gave the audience a taste of the types of music heard and enjoyed throughout Albion’s history. Eleven performances included musical styles of: the Civil War era, Parlor, Country, Irish, Blues, Soul, Hip-Hop, Folk, and Pop. Songs written in Albion were also featured which included “Sweetheart of Sigma Chi”, “Old Rugged Cross”, “Albion is Our Town, Your Town”.

Performers represented all ages and cultures in Albion from Matt Kleinow playing parlor music on his violin to Jeff Thomas sharing Blues and Soul to John Harden singing an

Irish tune to Civil War re-enactors playing instruments and singing songs of that era. And even former members of the Albion-based Goodwill Singers. Ten new memberships were gained that evening and over 200 people attended.

Thanks to Barb McAuliffe for all her work on putting this and all the programs together including the successful Garden party in June that had over 40 vendors and an estimated 450 people in attendance.

Albion Philanthropic Women Give to the Gardner House Museum

The Albion Philanthropic Women donated \$8,950 to the Albion Historical Society for the purchase of storm windows for the Gardner House Museum. Former Historical Society President Andy Zblewski said the Philanthropic Women’s donation enabled the Society to achieve the Albion Community Foundation and Rotary Club of Albion Foundation’s grant requirements that the storm windows be purchased and installed by the end of the year.

The Gardner House was built in 1875 by Albion hardware merchant Augustus P. Gardner, who came to Michigan from New York in 1837. He lived in this Victorian brick house until his death in 1905.

The Albion Historical Society purchased the Gardner House in May 1966 from the City of Albion and turned it into a museum. The Albion Historical Society received an Award of Merit from the American Association for State and Local History in 1969, and in 1971 the House was placed on the National Register of Historical Places.

The House was restored in 1966. However, weather and time have taken their toll since the last major work was done on it. Over the last six years the Society spent \$75,000 to preserve the house with a new roof, gutters, front porch, attic insulation, and exterior trim paint. \$17,000 was gifts from donors.

Our largest expense each year has been gas and electric. The House still has its 38 original single-pane glass windows, which are now 139 years old. Several of the windows are eight feet tall. The purchase of historic-style wood storm windows will help preserve the windows and maintain the period look of the House.

The Albion Historical Society thanks the Albion Philanthropic Women for their kind generosity and support of our local treasure, The Gardner House Museum.
